Share with me a meal and your thoughts 2018 Participatory workshop (Artifacts from workshop)

'Share With Me a Meal and Your Thoughts' involves the artist handing out cooked food to whoever asks of it. In return, the audience must sit with a fellow audience member they do not know, or are only acquainted with, and share a meal together.

Over the course of the meal the two will be asked to share a piece of knowledge with the other, to teach each other something they know. This could be anything; a few phrases in their native language, the best method for fishing for trout, a family recipe, how to make an origami swan, or a cool theory they learnt in a lecture.

This process of sitting and sharing a meal forms bonds, and by encouraging the sharing of knowledge, the artist provides a vessel for human connections to be made. The relational aesthetics of the interactions between two strangers forms the artwork of this piece.

#### Kensal's Green Grocery – Organic and Mediterranean Food Store, College Road, Kensal Green (November 2019)

Mohamad has owned Kensal's Green Grocery since October 2009. He is originally from Lebanon but is now a British citizen. He also owns the Dry Cleaner's next door. His wife, Fatima, is a civil engineer, but when she has off-time she lends a hand running the store. Together they have three children [ages at time of interview]; a son aged five and a half, a daughter aged four, and their youngest daughter, aged 9 months, can sometimes be seen sitting on Mohamad's lap as he runs the store.

I asked him if he'd ever want them to continue running the family business. He replied that, he'd love them to consider it as a healthy option, but his main priority is making sure they succeed in their education.

Over the years, the biggest changes in store was transitioning from only selling around five or six organic items, to having the shop's stock being comprised of around 70% organic items. Mohamad says he would have never had the chance to make this major change if it wasn't for the support from the local community. He says that everyone knows that Kensal Green is a very good community, especially after everyone rallied together to save the Kensal Green library, which is right across the road from Mohamad's store. He hopes that the community continues to support his corner shop.

#### C&D Food & Wine, College Road, Kensal Green (May 2020)

C&D Food & Wine is owned and run by Jaymini Patel and her husband Pritash Patel. I asked Jaymini, what's it like working here? She replied:

"I like working here, being in the community. This is the best community EVER. I like the people around here, they're so friendly." At that moment we were interrupted by a customer, named Kelly, who jokingly told me: "She likes ME the best!" I asked Kelly if she'd like to share any comments about the shop: "I love these guys. They're really kind. And they genuinely care about everything in the community. If somebody comes in and they don't have enough money or anything like that, they'll tell you, look, don't worry, come back when you do. They're good people. Really good people." Kelly and Jaymini both reach towards each other, in a sort of socially-distant hug. "I'm quite emotional." Kelly said.

As Kelly leaves the shop, Jaymini tells me she'd like to mention one big incident.

"Because of them [the customers] we are still here. It was about four years ago? Our landlord gave us, like, random notice to empty the shop and go. Our lease was coming to the end and he didn't give us enough time, he just gave us six months, which officially he can. And he gave us the notice and that's it. We didn't know what to do, where to go. My kid's born here, brought up here, we live above the shop. And this is what we have as a livelihood.

The community found out about this thing and they did a big petition online with the Brent council. The landlord already applied for planning permission which we didn't know. And they found out; the public, all the community, found out and got together and they stopped the planning permission for this property, and we got saved. I mean, it's just amazing, amazing support. People around here, they are the best. Because of them, we are here. And when the planning permission got declined – because the council saw the complaints from the community, the landlord had to cancel the planning. And so, we sorted out our lease – he charges us more but at least I'm not complaining. We got an extra ten years extension. Because of the public, otherwise we would have gone by now. Every day I do my prayers and I pray for this community. I cannot forget their support. Never. Wherever I go, even after this, they'll be always in my thoughts."

I asked her what her hopes and plans were for the future were: "Well, we don't have a choice, because our lease is coming to the end in like, three years, and we can't extend, because that was the deal, the commitment we made with the landlord when we renewed. But yeah after three years we just have to think of something else. But we would like to stay in this community." Another customer pipes in as he's at the checkout. "You're not leaving us?" She laughs. "Not yet!"
